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## CAMPUS POLICE

The University of Tennessee Police Department provides basic police services to Tennessee's largest university. The department's main objective is to provide a safe campus for students, staff, faculty and visitors. UT Police officers perform a variety of tasks which include: investigation of criminal activity, apprehension of criminals, accident and fire response, traffic enforcement, money transports and security for special events. The UT Police Department also offers posters, brochures, and seminars on a variety of topics; property engraving; statistical information; and many other services through the Community Relations Unit.

## UT POLICE FORCE

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## **TRAINING**

Police officers receive 420 hours of basic police training at the State Training Academy at Donelson, Tennessee, within their first six months of employment. Upon completion of the basic academy, officers are assigned to field training officers and must complete 640 hours of additional field training. Police officers complete a minimum of 88 hours of in-service training each year. Additional training may include topics such as:

- Cultural Diversity
- Crime Prevention
- Crime Scene Protection
- Evidence Handling
- Child Abuse
- Officer Stress Training
- Fire Safety
- Investigations
- Firearms
- Forensic Anthropology
- Statute Law/Legal Updates
- Rape Crisis
- Police Defensive Tactics
- Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)
- Basic First Aid
- Aerosol Control Options

## **POLICE AUTHORITY AND JURISDICTION**

The University of Tennessee police officers are duly commissioned State of Tennessee, Knox County and Knoxville City police officers. As such, UT Police officers have full police powers in the City of Knoxville, Knox County and on any other property contiguous to property of The University of Tennessee.

An agreement between the Knoxville City Police Department and The University of Tennessee regarding exercise of jurisdiction has been adopted and is operative on a case-by-case basis. The Knoxville City Police have primary investigative responsibility when the following crimes occur on University property:

(a) Violations of the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organization Act of 1989, T.C.A. Sections 39-12-201, et seq.

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(b) Aggravated assault and vehicular assault, as defined in T.C.A. Sections 39-13-102 and -106

(c) Criminal homicide, first degree murder, second degree murder, voluntary manslaughter, criminally negligent homicide, vehicular homicide, and viable fetus as victim, as defined in T.C.A. Sections 39-13-201, -202, -210, -211, -212, -213, and -214

(d) Kidnapping, aggravated kidnapping, and especially aggravated kidnapping, as defined in T.C.A. Sections 39-13-303, -304, and -305

(e) Aggravated robbery and especially aggravated robbery, as defined in T.C.A. Sections 39-13-402 and -403

(f) Aggravated rape, rape, aggravated sexual battery, sexual battery, statutory rape, and limited spousal exclusion, as defined in T.C.A. Sections 39-13-501 through -507. However, TCA-49-7-129 establishes that higher education law enforcement agencies are mandated to lead rape investigations.

(g) Arson, aggravated arson, and related crimes, as defined in T.C.A. Sections 39-14-301 through -306

(h) Especially aggravated burglary, as defined in T.C.A. Sections 39-14-404

Serious crimes and other incidents that are deemed to be of interest to state and/or local agencies are reported to those agencies. Crimes by University student groups at off-campus locations are reported to UT Police by local police authorities. All crimes which occur on campus are reported on a monthly basis to the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) and to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) headquarters for publication in the annual Uniform Crime Report.

As duly commissioned officers, UT Police carry service weapons. In general, "each officer of the department shall, in all cases, use only the minimum amount of force which is consistent with the accomplishment of his/her mission, and shall exhaust every other reasonable means of apprehension of defense before considering the use of a firearm."

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## **ACCESS TO THE CAMPUS**

The student handbook, *Hilltopics*, states that: “The University’s campuses and facilities shall be restricted to students, faculty, staff, guests and invitees except on such occasions when all or part of the campuses, buildings, stadia or other facilities are open to the general public.” The policy in its entirety may be found in *Hilltopics*.

## **TO REPORT A CRIME**

Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to report all crimes committed against them, or any crimes they might witness, to the UT Police Department. This may be done by telephone or in person. The UT Police Department operates on a 24 hour basis. A police dispatcher is always available to take information.

The University operates a telephone system which provides expanded emergency service to the University community. All 911 calls placed on campus telephones are routed to the Knoxville E-911 emergency dispatch center. The call is dispatched to UT Police and Knoxville City Police for response. All calls which are not of an emergency nature should be made directly to the UT Police Department by calling 974-3111.

Blue light emergency telephones (call boxes) are located at various sites on the campus. The call boxes are activated by pushing one of two buttons - a large red button which connects directly to the E-911 dispatcher, or a smaller black button which contacts the Knoxville Area Transit (KAT) dispatcher. In response to a call from an emergency blue-light telephone, police officers are immediately dispatched to the location of the call or complaint.

The location of the emergency blue-light call boxes are noted on the UT Campus Parking Map, which is available at the Campus Information Center in Circle Park, the UT Police Department at 1101 Cumberland Avenue, and the Parking Services Office at 2121 Stephenson Drive and online at <http://web.utk.edu/~pso/>.

## **CRIME STATISTICS REPORTING POLICIES**

The annual disclosure of the University of Tennessee’s crime statistics is a responsibility of the UT Police department and is assigned to a sergeant. This sergeant meets periodically with the UT Chief of Police to review the methodology used for data collecting and reporting procedures. Each fall, crime statistics from the previous year are made

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available in the Campus Security Brochure, which is also available online at <http://web.utk.edu/~homepage/> and [www.utpolice.org](http://www.utpolice.org).

The annual publication of data does include statistics on cases referred to the UT Police Department by the Knoxville Police and Knox County Sheriff's Departments. The publication of data does not include crimes reported by anonymous sources.

## **ILLEGAL DRUG POLICY**

A statement of policy related to illegal drugs is contained in the *UT Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual* and is published each year in the *Hilltopics: Student Handbook*. In support of the Drug Free Workplace Act of 1988 (Public Law 100-690), and the Drug Free Schools and Communities Act of 1989, The University of Tennessee is notifying all students, faculty and staff of the University Policy approved by the UT Board of Trustees on June 21, 1990.

“It is the policy of The University of Tennessee to maintain a safe and healthful environment for its students and employees.” Therefore, University policy prohibits the unlawful use, manufacture, possession, distribution, or dispensing of drugs (“controlled substances” as defined in the Controlled Substances Act 21, U.S.C. 812) and alcohol on University property or during University activities.

Violation of this policy is grounds for disciplinary action—up to and including immediate discharge for an employee and permanent dismissal for a student. Federal and state laws provide additional penalties for such unlawful activities, including fines and imprisonment" (21 U.S.C. 841 et seq.; T.C.A. 39-17-401 et seq.). Local ordinances also provide various penalties for drug and alcohol-related offenses. The University is bound to take all appropriate actions against violators, which may include referral for legal prosecution or requiring the individual to participate satisfactorily in an approved drug use/alcohol abuse assistance or rehabilitation program.

Aside from any University policy considerations, the use of illicit drugs and/or the abuse of alcohol may be harmful to your health. Some of the health risks associated with such use/abuse are described at the end of this section.

Individuals who are paid by The University of Tennessee from federal grants or contracts must notify the University of any criminal statute conviction which includes a finding of guilt, a plea of nolo contendere, or imposition of a sentence by any state or federal judicial body for a violation occurring in the workplace within five days after such conviction. The University is, in turn, required to inform the granting or contracting agency of such violation within ten days of the University's

receipt of notification.

Employees and their families needing treatment information should call their local Human Resources Office, Employee Assistance Program, or the State of Tennessee Employee Assistance Program (1-800-308-4934). Students needing treatment information should contact their campus Student Affairs Office, student health center, or counseling center.

Alcohol Abuse Health Risks: liver damage--cirrhosis, alcoholic hepatitis; heart disease--enlarged heart, congestive heart failure; ulcers and gastritis; malnutrition; cancer--of the mouth, esophagus, stomach, liver; brain damage--memory loss, hallucinations, psychosis; damage to fetus if pregnant mother drinks; death- 50% of fatal auto accidents involve alcohol, 31% of suicides are alcoholics

Drug Use Health Risks: overdosing--psychosis, convulsions, coma, death; long-term use--organ damage, mental illness, malnutrition, death; casual use--heart attack, stroke, brain damage, death; needles--infections, hepatitis, AIDS, death; if a pregnant mother uses drugs, her baby can be born addicted or dead”

The following acts are violations of the Standards of Conduct as defined in the student handbook, *Hilltopics*:

“Unlawful use, manufacture, possession, distribution or dispensing of drugs or alcohol on University-owned or controlled property or during University activities.”

A violation of the Standards of Conduct may result in permanent dismissal from the University.

## **ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE POLICY**

“Drinking or being under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs while on the job” or “the use, possession, or distribution of alcohol on University property” is a violation of the University work rules and is so stated in the *UT Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual*. Violation of work rules may be cause for disciplinary action including possible termination of employment.

As stated in the student handbook, *Hilltopics*, University regulations prohibit “all student organizations from serving or permitting the consumption, possession or display of any alcoholic beverage or containers at any time, or by anyone on University premises.” The “use, possession, or being under the influence of alcoholic beverages on University-owned or controlled property” is a violation of the Standards of Conduct as defined in *Hilltopics*.

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## SEXUAL OFFENSE POLICY/EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS

When a rape/sexual offense is reported, the University will make every effort to see that the victim is offered both medical and psychological care as well as information about prosecuting the suspect through both criminal and University disciplinary channels.

The University provides a variety of programs which are intended to promote awareness among students regarding the prevalence of rape and other sex offenses on the campus and in the Knoxville community. Among these are the following:

1. **Sexual Assault Awareness** - This one hour course, provided by UT Police, offers videos on rape awareness and prevention and provides students with information regarding counseling availability.
2. **Personal Safety Seminar** - This is a general seminar offered by UT Police which covers many safety topics including rape and sexual assault.
3. **Rape Aggression Defense** - This is a twelve hour course offered by UT Police which provides information on rape awareness and prevention and offers some physical defense training. Students receive a book with prevention information as part of the program.
4. **Advanced Rape Aggression Defense** - This is a sixteen hour course offered by UT Police which takes students beyond the topics of physical defense training offered in the course listed above.
5. **R.A.D. Keychain Defense** - This is an eight hour course offered by UT Police which provides information about using a small keychain or flashlight for self defense.
6. **Aerosol Defense Option** - This is a four hour course offered by UT Police which provides information about the various aerosol defense products available and their effects. The course does not endorse particular products.
7. **Various other programs** - UT Police and residence hall staff provide a variety of other programs dealing with sexual assault as a result of specific staff member interest and requests by students. Any person who desires to have such programs may request them through RAs or other staff.

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## PROCEDURES FOR REPORTING A SEX OFFENSE

Persons who become victims of sex offenses should do the following:

1. **Get to a safe place as soon as possible.**
2. **Try to preserve all physical evidence.** A victim should not wash her/his hands, bathe, use the toilet or change clothing. If the victim does change clothes, she/he should place all of the clothing which was worn at the time in a paper (not plastic) bag.
3. **Seek medical attention.** A medical examination will provide any necessary treatment and collect important evidence. UT Police are available to transport sexual assault victims to a hospital or the Sexual Assault Forensic Exam Center where a rape victim examination may be conducted.
4. **Call UT Police.** To report an incident that has just occurred, or to report an incident at a later date, call the UT Police at 974-3111. Victims are encouraged to bring a friend for support.

NOTE: Reporting an incident is a separate step from choosing to prosecute. When a person files a report, they are not obligated to continue with legal proceedings or University disciplinary action.

Reporting an incident to the UT Police helps:

- apprehend the alleged assailant
- maintain future options regarding criminal prosecution, University disciplinary action, and/or civil action against the perpetrator.
- protects the victim and others from future assaults by the same assailant.

When an incident is reported, a UT Police officer will complete an Incident Report. Primary responsibility for the investigation of sexual offense cases rests with the UT Police Department. UT Police will make arrangements for a victim to meet with a Knoxville Police officer who will take a written report. The report will be important to the victim in case she/he wishes to bring charges, immediately or at a later date. The victim may be asked questions about the scene of the crime, any witnesses, and what happened before and after the incident. Victims should be aware that the Incident Report registered with UT Police and the report made to the Knoxville Police are considered part of the public record.

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It is always the victim's option whether or not to notify UT or Knoxville Police. University personnel will be made available to help a victim with this notification if they desire and request such assistance.

**5. Seek counseling or other support.** Students who wish to speak to someone confidentially are encouraged to contact the Student Counseling Center (974-2196), the Student Health Center (974-3135), or SafeHaven (Knoxville Sexual Assault Crisis Center) (558-9040). A counselor or specially trained staff member can help a victim explore options, give information, and provide emotional support.

**6. Contact the Office of Student Judicial Affairs.** If the suspect is a student, the victim is encouraged to contact the Office of Student Judicial Affairs (974-3171). All University Student Affairs staff members, including those from the Office of the Dean of Students and the Department of University Housing, can assist the victim in contacting the UT Police and the Office of Student Judicial Affairs.

## **OTHER UNIVERSITY RESPONSES**

The University seeks to be supportive of victims of sexual assault in as many ways as possible. In order to demonstrate this support, the University will change a victim's living and/or academic situation(s) when such changes are reasonably available and are requested by the victim. Such requests should be made to the staff in the Office of the Dean of Students who will assist the victim in making these adjustments.

As of 8/1/2004 Tennessee State Law 40-39-201 requires that all out of state sexual offenders who will be working or attending the University of Tennessee must register with the U.T. Police Department within 48 hours of arriving at the University of Tennessee.

All in state sexual offenders will register with the law enforcement agency that has jurisdiction in their residential are.

## **JUDICIAL PROCEDURES**

Students accused of sexual offenses will be charged with violat-

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ing Standard of Conduct #8: “Physical abuse of any person or other conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any person whether such conduct occurs on or off University property. In no event shall this rule be construed to prevent speech protected by the First Amendment to the United States Constitution.” Special rights pertain to the victim if a suspect is charged with violating Standard of Conduct #8. The procedures for adjudicating such violations are described in detail in *Hilltopics*, the student handbook of the University of Tennessee, Knoxville campus. These procedures include the following:

Persons accused of violations of Standards of Conduct are entitled to written notice of the alleged violation, including an account of the alleged misconduct, witnesses to the alleged misconduct, notice of the scheduled hearing delivered 72 hours before the hearing and notice of the maximum allowable penalty, (i.e. permanent dismissal). The accused may schedule an appointment with the staff, appointed by the Office of Student Judicial Affairs, who will assist him/her in defending such charges, or the accused has the right to assistance of his/her choice. At the hearing, the accused may testify or remain silent at his/her option, present witnesses, have his/her case heard only on the misconduct specified in the written notice, challenge the admissibility of evidence, remain silent or confront or cross-examine all available adverse witnesses and/or challenge the seating of any board member for good cause. At the hearing, determinations are made as to guilt or innocence and penalty if appropriate. The accused has the right to have in writing a decision specifying the rule violated, the penalty assessed and the right to appeal.

The disciplinary action of any board may be appealed to the next higher board. Appeals from the Student Disciplinary Boards may be made to the Student Tribunal or Student Affairs Council. In all cases the request for appeal must be submitted in writing to the Dean of Students within seven (7) calendar days of written notice of the board decision. If the seventh day falls on a weekend or holiday, the time is extended to the next regular workday. All appeals (except those to the Student Affairs Council, which may elect to hear the case de novo) must be taken upon the record made before the original board. Pending the outcome of an appeal, the penalty specified in the original decision shall not be imposed.

Both the accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have other persons present during a campus disciplinary proceeding. The victim, therefore, has the right to have counsel of his/her choice present during a Student Disciplinary Board hearing. In the

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event a student defendant elects to have a public hearing, both the accuser and the accused have the right to have counsel, as well as others, present. In addition, both the accuser and the accused shall be informed of the outcome of any campus disciplinary proceeding brought as a result of the allegation of a sex offense. This information may be shared with both the accuser and accused in accord with the **Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)** and the **Tennessee Public Records Act**. The final results of disciplinary proceedings will be disclosed to third parties in accord with the limited exceptions set forth in the **Family Education Rights and Privacy Act** and the **Tennessee Public Records Act**.

## **INCIDENTS OF BIAS**

Students should report incidents of bias to the proper University authority, i.e. UT Police Department, Residence Hall Director, etc. The report will then be forwarded to the Office of the Dean of Students. Students may contact the Office of the Dean of Students at 865-974-3179 with any questions or concerns.

## **SANCTIONS**

Sanctions for the violation of any Standard of Conduct may include any of the following:

1. Loss of Privileges
2. Disciplinary Reprimand
3. Disciplinary Probation
4. Suspension for a Specific Period of Time
5. Indefinite Suspension
6. Permanent Dismissal

## **POSSESSION OF WEAPONS**

Possession of weapons on the University campus can be authorized only by the UT Chief of Police. Unauthorized possession of weapons is a felony.

The *UT Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual* contains work rules which apply to University employees. "Unauthorized possession of firearms, explosive materials, or other lethal materials on University premises" is a violation of University work rules.

*Hilltopics*, the student handbook, prohibits "possession, while on University owned or controlled property or at University-sponsored or supervised activities, of any weapon such as, but not limited to, rifles, shotguns, ammunition, handguns, and air guns, including

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explosives, such as firecrackers, unless authorized in writing by the Chief of Police."

Weapons that are brought to campus by students for sporting purposes must be checked in and stored at the UT Police Department.

## **SECURITY CONSIDERATIONS IN MAINTENANCE OF CAMPUS FACILITIES**

Every effort is made by the grounds staff of the University's Physical Plant to ensure that the campus grounds and landscaping are maintained in such a way as to eliminate natural obstructions which could otherwise become safety concerns. Periodically, a lighting survey is performed by a group of campus representatives in conjunction with the UT Police Department. Based on results of past surveys, significant improvements in outdoor lighting and placements of emergency blue-light telephones have been made.

## **EVENING AND SPECIAL TRANSPORTATION**

The T (provided by Knoxville Area Transit) offers the "LATE NITE SHUTTLE" with daily evening fixed route bus service around campus and select areas of Ft. Sanders. Hours are Sunday-Thursday, 6pm-2 am, Friday-Saturday, 6 pm-3:30 am at 15 minute intervals. The T also provides demand response feeder service with "LINK" during LATE NITE SHUTTLE service hours, and point-to-point service between the end of the LATE NITE SHUTTLE and 7:00 am. ## **CROSSWALK SAFETY PROGRAM**

The UT Police Department sponsors a crosswalk safety program which is designed to increase overall awareness of the dangers of pedestrian traffic. Additional crosswalks have been installed, designated and the speed limit in most of these areas has been reduced to 25 MPH.

## **COMMUNICATION OF SECURITY MATTERS**

A daily listing of criminal activities reported to the UT Police Department is printed, at the discretion of their staff, in the campus newspaper, *The Daily Beacon*, under a section titled "Crime Log." These activities are also made public by the Knoxville city newspapers, local radio and television stations.

The UT Police Department distributes a monthly report of any criminal activities occurring in the residence halls that have been

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reported. The report is also sent to UT Residence Halls and UT family housing. A listing of incidents reported in parking areas accompanies the report. Additionally, the UT Police Department provides timely notifications on serious incidents to the student body via electronic mail and via posting flyers. These warnings will occur when a crime is an ongoing threat to students or employees.

## COMMUNITY RELATIONS UNIT

The UT Police Department sponsors crime prevention programs in which officers explain how students can protect themselves and their property, show films and distribute brochures. Officers speak to students and parents at orientation sessions, hall representatives in residence halls, students in the Panhellenic Building and employees who work in the UT residence halls. A seminar may be scheduled by calling the UT Police Department Community Relations Unit at 974-4674 or UT Police at 974-3111. Programs on the following subjects have been developed and are on the UT Police Department's website; [www.utpolice.org](http://www.utpolice.org)

- **Substance Abuse (The facts on alcohol and other drugs):**

This seminar is designed to heighten awareness as to the dangers of alcohol/drug abuse, including *Hilltopics* rules and Tennessee State laws. (45 minutes)

- **Alcohol Awareness for Spring Break:** This seminar covers alcohol rules/laws in several popular spring break vacation areas such as Florida and Mexico. (30 minutes)

- **Fatal Vision:** This is an alcohol abuse awareness program in which **Fatal Vision Goggles** are used to demonstrate vision impairment. (Time depends on number of participants)

- **Pedestrian Safety:** This program is designed to heighten awareness of laws and safety guidelines for pedestrians. (30 minutes)

- **Bicycle Safety:** This program provides information regarding laws and rules relating to cycling as well as theft prevention techniques, information about locking devices and an opportunity to register and engrave bicycles. (Time depends on number of participants)

- **Vehicle Safety:** This program provides information regarding vehicle safety, including how to approach a vehicle safely, changing flat

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tires, items to carry in a vehicle for safety purposes and theft prevention techniques. (45 minutes)

- **Operation Identification:** This is a program in which UT Police officers are present in various locations to provide theft prevention methods and to provide the opportunity for property registration and engraving. (Time depends on number of participants)

- **UT Police 101:** This is a program that provides information on the services offered by the UT Police, describes the purpose for having police on campus and offers an opportunity for students to get to know police personnel.

- **Sexual Assault Awareness:** This seminar provides videos on rape awareness and prevention, counseling availability and what to do if a person becomes a victim of rape. (1 hour)

- **Rape Aggression Defense (R.A.D.) Basic Course:** This woman's self defense course, taught in three consecutive days, provides information on rape awareness and prevention and offers physical defense training. (12 hours)

- **Advanced R.A.D.:** This course takes students beyond the topics of physical defense training offered in the course listed above. (16 hours)

- **R.A.D. Aerosol Defense Option:** This class provides information about various aerosol defense products available and their effects. The course does not endorse particular products. (4 hours)

- **R.A.D. Keychain Defense:** This program provides information about using a small keychain or flashlight for self defense. (8 hours or 4 hours for former R.A.D. Basic students)

- **Workplace Violence:** Information regarding the escalating problem of violence in the workplace. Identification of traits and characteristics of potentially violent people, prevention and avoidance strategies. Includes a "role playing" exercise. (1 hour)

- **Personal Safety:** Realistic approach, realistic safety tips. Includes an overview on the pros and cons of self-defense devices from

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whistles to pepper sprays. (45 minutes)

All seminars are free to UT students. Seminars are available upon request. Literature and brochures are distributed at most seminars, and seminars may be scheduled by calling the UTPD Community Relations Unit (974-4674).

## **UNIVERSITY HOUSING**

Two departments are responsible for housing at The University of Tennessee, Knoxville. The Department of University Housing has responsibility for the on-campus, traditional housing needs of students and provides off-campus housing facilities for married and graduate students. The Office of Fraternity Affairs coordinates the activities of the house corporations which supervise housing in each fraternity house.

### **RESIDENCE HALLS**

#### **Types of Housing**

The University of Tennessee, Knoxville has a residence hall capacity of 7,213 students. There are twelve traditional halls and one apartment style hall. Of the traditional halls, four (Hess, Greve, Massey, Strong) offer double room accommodations with a common bath on each floor. Melrose Hall is an all single room hall for freshmen students. The remaining seven traditional halls (Clement, Gibbs, North Carrick, South Carrick, Humes, Morrill, Reese) offer suite accommodations with four persons in two rooms sharing a bath. Six halls (Apartment Residence Hall, Clement, Hess, Morrill, Greve) provide housing for men and women in different sections of the building.

#### **Housing Assignments**

Residence hall assignments are based on the date of the application for housing. Current residents are allowed to re-apply for space before new applicants are assigned. If a student wants to move to another room or hall, the student may request a reassignment. Reassignments to another room or another hall are made throughout the year on a space available basis except for the first two weeks of the academic term. After that, requests are reviewed by the Hall Directors and approved on a space available basis.

#### **Security**

Each residence hall lobby desk is staffed twenty-four hours a day by departmental personnel. During periods of visitation, all members

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of the opposite sex must be escorted by their hosts at all times in non-public areas of the halls. All maintenance and service personnel are required to sign-in at the main desk and to wear identification badges while in the residence halls. Whenever possible, escorts are provided for such personnel. Deliveries may not be made directly to student rooms.

Each residence hall staff consists of one full-time, live-in Hall Director, at least one live-in Assistant Hall Director plus one Resident Assistant per floor. The University currently employs thirteen Hall Directors, seventeen Assistant Hall Directors and 157 Resident Assistants. Formal training is conducted by the Department of University Housing in conjunction with various offices on campus prior to fall semester. Training includes a safety component for head staff which is taught by the University's Environmental Health and Safety Office. In addition, in-service training is planned throughout the year for Hall Directors and Assistant Hall Directors. All new Resident Assistants attend a 15 session training class during the Spring Term before they begin working as Resident Assistants.

In the twelve traditional halls, all exterior doors, excluding the lobby entrance, are locked so that entrance to the building is by the twenty-four hour staffed main desk. In a few cases, student room keys will unlock specific exterior doors so that the student may gain access to the building at those locations. During nightly hall walks, all exit doors are checked to ensure that they are secure. In addition, security cameras have been installed in all of the residence halls, allowing the desk staff to monitor the exterior doors. The apartment style hall has six exterior entrances, all monitored by the security camera system. Door access card readers have been installed in all halls: Clement, Massey, Greve, Melrose, Gibbs, Hess, North Carrick, South Carrick, Strong, Reese, Humes and the Apartments. In Greve, Clement, Massey, Gibbs, Hess, Reese, Strong, Morrill, North Carrick, South Carrick, and Humes, the card readers control access from the lobbies to the living areas. In Melrose and the Apartments, all outside entrances have card readers. Students use their University IDs to gain access to the building or living area. Access is restricted to the residents of the building and residence halls staff.

All residence hall rooms are equipped with U. L. approved smoke detectors, and all halls have F.L.P.A. approved fire alarm systems. All buildings are wired to sound an alarm in a central monitoring station. Five buildings (Gibbs, Hess, Morrill, Clement and Massey) are equipped with sprinkler systems that include sprinkler heads in each room and common area. Evacuation drills are conducted each term.

All room doors have deadbolt locks. If a key is lost or mis-

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placed, the room is re-cored, and new keys are issued. Residents are urged to keep their doors locked at all times. Periodic inspections by the residence hall staff remind students to lock their doors. All windows are equipped with locking devices. Door viewers have been installed in all student room doors.

At the beginning of each semester, floor meetings are held to discuss safety and security issues. Safety brochures are given to each resident with pamphlets, posters and sandwich boards displayed throughout the halls. Educational programs are presented periodically in the halls to increase residents' awareness of safety and the steps they may take to improve their personal safety. Such program topics include self-defense, operation ID, and date rape.

One residence hall (Apartment Residence Hall) remains open during University breaks. All other halls are closed. Lobby desks are staffed twenty-four hours a day in the halls which remain open. Staff members conduct regular tours and inspections of these halls.

### **Guest Policy**

Residence hall students may have overnight guests of the same sex only if prior arrangements have been made with the roommate(s). The maximum length of any visit is three days and three nights. All guests are governed by University and Residence Hall regulations, and it is the host's responsibility to make guests aware of these rules. In cases where the guest is in violation of University regulations, disciplinary action may be brought against the host. During the course of their stay, guests may be asked to provide identification.

## **GRADUATE AND FAMILY HOUSING**

### **Types of Housing**

The Department of University Housing provides multi-family housing for married students, single parents, graduate students, advanced professionals and non-traditional undergraduate students. Additionally, housing is provided for visiting scholars on a limited basis. These facilities include one, two, and three bedroom apartments in two apartment communities located within a three-mile radius of the campus. Golf Range and Sutherland are garden style apartments.

### **Housing Assignments**

Housing assignments in these communities are made on a first-come, first-served basis, according to the date the student's application materials are received. Requests for transfer are processed when space becomes available, and after all first-time applicants have been satisfied.

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## **Security**

Each housing complex is staffed by a Resident Manager, Assistant Resident Manager, Senior Secretary, and an in-house maintenance crew varying in size from six to eight people. As these facilities were designed as single family units, there are no formal provisions for guest check-in. Guests are met by residents at the apartment door, or as they inquire at the apartment complex office.

All apartment doors have key locks, and deadbolts are available to all tenants upon request. Laurel Apartments has door access card readers on primary entrances to the building. Residents in this facility use their University ID to gain access between the hours of midnight and 8:00 a.m. Access is restricted to building residents and staff. Residents are encouraged to keep all doors and windows locked, and report suspicious activities. All complexes are patrolled by University of Tennessee Police.

To increase residents' awareness of safety each new resident is given a "Welcome Packet" containing information about emergency services, personal safety, and departmental policies. The Department of University Housing also conducts periodic programming activities designed to enhance residents' awareness of personal safety issues. Community newsletters are also used as a vehicle to disseminate safety tips and programming information.

All apartments are equipped with hard-wired smoke detectors and fire extinguishers, which are inspected on a quarterly basis. Laurel Apartments is equipped with a central fire alarm system.

Residents are allowed to occupy the apartments year round, as in traditional apartment complex living. During low occupancy periods, such as holidays and summer semester, residents are encouraged to be especially aware of suspicious activities.

## **Guest Policy**

Residents of graduate and family housing units are asked to report all guests staying with them in the apartments. Guests are limited to a stay of two (2) weeks without prior consent of the Department of University Housing. Any visitor wishing to stay longer than two (2) weeks must receive permission from the Department of University Housing prior to arrival.

All guests are governed by University and University Housing regulations, and it is the host's responsibility to make guests aware of these rules. In cases where the guest is in violation of University regulations, disciplinary action may be brought against the host. During the course of their stay, guests may be asked to provide identification.

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## **OFFICE OF FRATERNITY AFFAIRS**

### **Types of Housing**

The University of Tennessee fraternity community is comprised of 22 national fraternal organizations. Of those 22 fraternities, 15 are housed within the parameters of the UT campus - 12 in Fraternity Park, 1 on Melrose Avenue, 1 on Lake Avenue and one on Francis Street. Thirteen fraternity houses, built in 1966, located in Fraternity Park have a combined capacity for 436 beds, with an average capacity for 37 students. There is one newly constructed house in Fraternity Park, completed in 1998, with a capacity of 30 beds. All of the Fraternity Park houses offer both single and double rooms, with varying bathroom and shower facilities. One chapter rents its house from the Department of University Housing, and one chapter owns its respective facility.

### **Housing Assignments**

All "Park" housing assignments are made by the individual chapters. Residents must be members of the chapter, and enrolled at The University of Tennessee. New housing agreements, information cards, and contracting process guidelines are distributed in early March to the President of each chapter. They are completed and returned to the Office of Fraternity Affairs no later than the third week of April.

### **Security**

Each Fraternity has a Housing Corporation which elects a Housing Corporation Spokesperson (HCS). This HCS is an alumni member of the fraternity and is ultimately responsible for the security of the house.

The downstairs areas of the houses are public areas. For the non-public areas, each chapter has their own security policies. All maintenance personnel are admitted to the houses by the president of the chapter or his designee. Maintenance personnel wear identification badges while in the house. Deliveries are made to the individual resident's rooms.

The exterior doors of the houses are secured with a lock device (mostly punch code locks). In a few cases, student room keys will unlock specific exterior doors so that students may gain access to the building at these locations.

All houses are equipped with proper fire and safety equipment, and are inspected by the UT Office of Environmental Health and Safety once per semester. Fire evacuation drills are held each semester.

All room doors have key locks. If a key is lost or stolen, new

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keys are issued by the HCS or his designee. Residents are urged to keep their doors locked at all times.

The fraternities have the option of keeping their houses open during breaks. Occupancy reports must be filed with the Office of Fraternity Affairs and the UT Police Department during all breaks.

### **HAZING POLICY**

Participation of students in hazing activities is prohibited. "Hazing" means any intentional or reckless act, on or off University property, by one student, acting alone or with others, which is directed against any other student, that endangers the mental or physical health or safety of that student, or which induces or coerces a student to endanger his or her mental or physical health or safety, and includes treatment of a violent, abusive, shameful, insulting, or humiliating nature. Such action is prohibited when connected with initiation into or affiliation with an organization and does not include participation in customary athletic events or similar competition.

A student committing an act of "hazing" is subject to disciplinary action in accordance with the Code of Student Conduct.

In all of the preceding charts, the crime rate is based on the numbers and categories of actual offenses (crimes) reported to the TBI on forms provided by that agency. As required by the Tennessee College and University Security and Information Act, the rate is computed using the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) undergraduate and graduate students and the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) employees on the Knoxville campus (29,563 for 2004, 30,972 for 2005 and 32,249 for 2006).

For the Department of Education Reports, the column for Student Resident Facilities and Crimes of Prejudice are not in addition to, but rather subsets of the number reported in the Campus column.

Regulations associated with the Department of Education Crime Report require that the University report "occurrences", as distinguished from "offenses" reported in the preceding tables. It is also important to note that occurrences on non-university property contiguous to the campus must also be reported.
